# OilCAN

As part of CAN's commitment to help combat the rising costs of domestic and commercial heating oil, in 2012 we linked with Oxfordshire Rural Community Council, to start up a county-wide oil bulk-buying scheme which we named OilCAN. This provided administration to use the power of bulk buying to negotiate the best possible price 'on the day' so that individuals did not have to ring around to check prices.

From relatively small beginnings we now have 473 members and 14 volunteer/member co-ordinators as local contacts.

We were concerned that originally, the far north of the county suffered with higher prices, purely due to the distance of their homes and businesses from the depots but in March this year we were delighted to find that the whole county was now being serviced by one supplier and all at the same price, no matter what their post code. The hard work and advertising of our co-ordinators and members in the far north attracted so many new members that, even in Oxfordshire, they are now well known as the 'TDs', and order more oil themselves than several of the other counties who are part of the scheme.

The June orders have just been negotiated, and despite the expected rise in prices, the details of these, and the May orders still show a healthy saving for our members:

Business and community memberships: As we are part of a national project where the prices of membership are set nationally, we have always had a concern that small rural businesses and schools in Northumberland would be deterred from joining due to the £100 membership fee. Following representation from CAN and other Rural Community Councils involved in the project we have agreed a staged membership fee based on annual usage.

Under 5,000 litres usage per annum = £30 5,000 to 10,000 litres usage per annum = £60 Over 10,000 litres per annum =£100

As existing business memberships come up for renewal they will be moved to the new charging system based on previous use. New members will be asked to provide evidence of usage over the past 12 months, orders, invoices etc.

We still need a new co-ordinator to cover a small group of members in the Kirknewton/Milfield area, as our previous co-ordinator has moved out of the area; we will also be saying a sad farewell to one of our founding co-ordinators who covers the Byrness area, as she too is moving away. Thanks to all of the co-ordinators for their hard work and perseverance in advertising the scheme, answering queries, putting potential members in touch with us and pulling together the orders from members of their group each month.

We couldn't run the scheme without their help.
